2010 Fifa World Cup South Africa

For four weeks in 2010, South Africa will be the centre of the world. The eyes of billions of television viewers, an estimated three million international visitors and the cream of the world's sporting media will be focused on the southern tip of Africa.

Preparation for the tournament has seen changes in the infrastructure with an estimated spend in the region of R5 billion on building and renovating 10 World Cup stadiums, R5 billion on upgrades to the country's airports, and R3.5 billion on improvements to the country's road and rail network.

The World Cup will see an estimated R21 billion put into South Africa's economy, generating an estimated R12 billion in direct spending and creating an estimated 160,000 new jobs.



Infrastructure

Airport Upgrades

Primary upgrades in the international airports include additional terminals and system upgrades to ensure they can cope with the influx of visitors in 2010. A budget of R132 Million has been allocated to maintenance work being carried out on domestic airports. Not only will airports to be equipped to cope with the increased traffic demands, but they will also have to take account of future and long-term infrastructure requirements which go beyond the Soccer World Cup.

Transport

The Gautrain are one of the newest additions to the SA Transport System. Gautrain carries high hopes, not the least of which is creating, directly and indirectly, an additional two million jobs by 2025. Projections estimate that the Gautrain project has already created or sustained more than 29 400 jobs.

Gautrain Security

- Hi tech security systems and security staff will guard Gautrain passengers.
- Only valid ticket holders will have access to station precincts, car parks and trains.
- Automatic fare collection systems will electronically scan tickets and smart cards swiped at station access gates.
- CCTV systems will monitor every station concourse, parking area and station precinct.
- The SAPS Railway Police will patrol each station.
- Station platforms will be guarded by alarms to prevent any unauthorised entry into tunnels or on the tracks.
- Inside every train, CCTV cameras will monitor passenger movements. Live footage is examined by train drivers and at the central control centre.
- Each train will also be manned by two security guards.

Football Facilities

Stadia -

- Soccer City (also known as the FNB Stadium) is earmarked to host both the opening and final matches of the 2010 Soccer World Cup. Built in 1987, Soccer City has played host to some of the most memorable matches in South Africa's soccer history.
- New and improved CCTV systems have been installed and mobile police units will be placed around the venue.
- Air support will be used throughout the tournament to assist all stadia security.
- A total of 10 stadia will be upgraded for the World Cup between Johannesburg, Cape Town, Bloemfontein, Port Elizabeth, Pretoria and Nelspruit. 3 stadia passed inspection outright with 5 requiring minimal work and the final two requiring full rebuild.
- Training grounds will be placed in small stadia through the nation to host the qualified teams.





Policing + Security for 2010

- The South African Police Service has been allocated R600-million on top of its annual budget to prepare for the 2010 Fifa World Cup, mostly to purchase equipment ranging from light aircraft to retractable fencing.
- The police intend to buy four Pilatus PC-12 light aircraft to patrol the skies above World Cup venues. The planes will be equipped with video cameras that send live footage to officers on the ground.
- South Africa will deploy 30 000 dedicated police officers in host cities during the event, while an extra 50 000 reservists to be recruited by 2010 to supplement the country's current reserve force of 45 000.
- In addition, every host city will have a dedicated 2010 police station with separate holding cells, a courtroom for speedy judgments and a Home Affairs office for possible deportations.
- International police officers from every country playing in the event will also be present, wearing their own uniforms, to assist the public and keep an eye out for trouble.
- The Police and Interpol met this year to share access to databases of dangerous and unwanted visitors, including terrorists, organised criminals and soccer hooligans.
